# February 2023

God Finds Entry in the Soft Heart

Matthew 5...

Blessed are the poor in spirit...

Blessed are those who mourn...

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness...

It is a different blessing when we read and hear them without the adjoining promise. This is certainly not to remove the promise from the word of Christ, but it is perhaps a beneficial tool to call our attention to the real and present blessing. Christ blessed the people, the category, and the condition. And perhaps there too, it is nothing that Christ had to bless in order to make it "good" but something Christ had to name in order to call our attention to the vulnerability we may wish to evade.

There are two forms of the Beatitudes within the gospels. The Gospel Author of Luke (6.20) includes it within the "Sermon on the Plain" (Luke holds a theme of "lowliness" throughout) and there emphasizes a material state of the human body - poverty, hunger, exclusion. According to Luke, the divine pronouncements of the beatitudes stress the profound shift in theology that God would favor and bless the conditions of the physical body that the world identifies as weakness and unworthy, creating a profound shift in ecclesiology (matters of the community) and welcoming those that power had marginalized. The Gospel Author of Matthew reiterates the beatitudes with an emphasis on the condition of the heart: "poor in spirit," "mourn," "hunger and thirst for righteousness." These are conditions of the heart that are on the losing side according to the powers of the world - they are all indications and acknowledgments of weakness. And Christ blesses these hearts - the condition they are in and the people who hold them.

Blessed is the heart who knows of its belonging to God, but has not found a community to honor the same truth.

Blessed is the heart that has loved, accompanied, and hoped, and lost.

Blessed is the heart who understands the pains and sufferings of injustice and has offered itself to justice, only to encounter struggle.

These conditions of the heart... it's defeated in one perspective. But it's holy from the perspective of Christ. For the heart in every one of these named blessings has offered itself to great love. There is the blessing. We can honor the promises of what will come to every wounded heart, but let us not overlook the blessing made plain - that the vulnerable heart is named for it is the heart that is open to great love.

May we have the courage to offer our hearts to great love, and discover blessing upon blessing as we do.

p. 2 In 1931, librarian S. R. Ranganathan proposed five principles for operating a successful library system. Principles 2 and 3 are "Every reader his/her book" and "Every book its reader." When I am ordering books for my library, I often think about these principles. I ask myself, "Will every reader in my diverse community come in and find a book that meets their educational, recreational, informational, and cultural needs? Will every book we purchase get checked out, read, and appreciated by a reader?"

Lately, I've been thinking about how Ranganathan's principles could have an application for the Church. Could we say "Every member his/her ministry and Every ministry his/her member"?

What if everyone who engaged with Hiram Christian Church found a ministry that would not only meet their spiritual needs, but also serve the Kingdom of God? What if every opportunity for ministry that arose had someone to cultivate and grow it for a bountiful harvest?

At the Annual Meeting in November, we identified seven Teams: Church in the World, Hospitality, Stewards, Spiritual Formation, Finance, Memorials, and Personnel. Each of these Teams offers rich ministry opportunities; the Teams provide the framework for doing the good work we are called to by Jesus the Christ, and which he modeled during his life.

I would love to see every member and friend of the church actively engaged in a ministry that best suits his or her spiritual gifts. I would love to see ministries starting up from the roots, and members eagerly coming forward to tend to them.

The Team structure is a way for this to happen. Each Team provides opportunities for ministry and service--large and small, long and short term, established and still just potential. This year, the opportunities and the needs are especially important, as we act on our Vision: To be partners in God's healing work through a wide welcome of all, through cultivating relationship and beloved community, and by following Christ in the way of Love.

What ministry will you focus on this year? What Good will you do in service of the Kingdom of God and our community?

I encourage you to consider this with prayer and discernment. If you feel God calling you to serve in some way, contact a Team Leader, Pastor Chris, Head Elder Marcia Muster, or myself. We'd be glad to discuss your calling or help you identify it.

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# Do a Dollar - From your Church Treasurer:

We finished 2022 with a deficit far smaller than we had predicted! We had a balance of about \$22,600 to carry forward into the new year. However, our proposed budget for 2023 still calls for slightly more than that just to be in balance.



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Our income for 2023 will need to increase by almost \$23,000 in order to meet budgeted expenses. We currently have about 65 households who contribute regularly to Hiram Christian Church. If each household would contribute just one more dollar for each day in 2023, we could avoid a deficit.

They are the New Revised Standard Version, Updated Edition—the version recommended by Rev. Chris McCreight. They were funded entirely by generous donations from church members and friends. Each Bible has a front page naming the donor(s) and the person or people honored or remembered by the donation.

We now have thirteen additional Bibles (same edition)—again funded entirely by donations. They will be inscribed and placed in the pews soon—and there are plans also to provide donated magnifying bookmarks to help some of our older eyes as we read the scriptures.

Thank you to all who donated to provide Bibles, and thank you to all the writers who inscribed the dedication pages. We are blessed to have these Bibles available every Sunday.

### **Preparations and Plans for the Sabbatical:**

Sabbatical is a generous and generative gift. It is a time of renewal for the clergy member, where one is invited into a rare season that may lead them into rhythms, ideas, and communities that are new and old. It is a time of renewal for the congregation as well, where they are visited by a new minister or ministers, who serve with their faithful gifts and graces. There is renewal within each body that leads to a generative gift in the return to partnership and service.

I am grateful that Hiram Christian Church has understood the benefit of sabbatical - having a history of including sabbatical within their letters of call with past ministers. Our theme for the season will be, Everything (and Everyone) Belongs.

As it comes to Lent, it is nearly an "Anti-Lent" thematic. For while common practice has invited us to reflect upon our lives and consider what one thing we'd like to give up for the season to draw us closer to God, this will proceed another direction and ask us to reflect upon those elements of our being that we may wish to give up and forfeit (and spend great deals of energy and time trying to deny ourselves) and seek to acknowledge, honor, and perhaps even love that part of the self.


It is the hope that this season will lead us to embrace ourselves as beloved children of God (the whole self) and lead us to more deeply love ourselves. This, in turn, is to cultivate a broader and deeper love that we may offer others.

As our visioning process has led us to identify three priorities for this season: discipleship/tradition, belonging, and loving justice in our communities - I think that this Lenten theme will engage the wisdom and grace of our tradition, cultivate a stronger sense of our belonging to God and self, and lead us in stepping into our homes and communities with a transforming love and vision for our time.

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I am pleased to share the framework with you here:

I have identified the following intentions for this sabbatical: contemplative practice, reading, worship, and deep rest.

I will participate in coursework with the Center for Action and Contemplation, and then take retreat at the Gethsemani Abbey to continue to learn and engage this practice. My hope is that I may more deeply understand contemplative prayer and practice, that I may be able to guide others in the approach and beginning practice.

I have amassed a wonderful library of books of poetry, practice, theology, management, etc and engage it sparingly due to time and energy. I would like to incorporate a practice of reading daily, establishing a new rhythm to continue upon return.

I will visit and attend worship throughout the sabbatical season. It is my intention to not only attend worship at neighboring churches, but to attend worship at Synagogues and Mosques as well. My desire in this is to not only engage in the practice of worship, but to learn how other communities of faith create their services, and to establish a sense of relationship with clergy in Northeast Ohio.

And, I plan to rest well. It is common practice for new clergy to engage more fully with the congregation in the first year of call - listening, learning, and creating relationships. I am unsure if the nature of a bi-vocational call leads this intense engagement to be a bi-annual process, or if my excitement led me to over-extend myself in ways, but I found this to be the case - a situation I was pleased with and content with. Of course, right about the time I saw a sense of "balance" come into view, the pandemic entered the landscape and that has brought its own disruption to everyone. I am eager to use this time to rest well and also establish a rhythm of rest that can continue upon and after my return, because we know from our tradition and experience that regular practices of rest are holy all by itself, and they have the added gift of leading us to live and serve better.

#### Restoration and Learning:

I am interested in attending various communities of faith and organizations of sacred practice to participate in services of worship as appropriate, to learn how others lead/organize/teach practices, and to develop some familiarity if not relationship with clergy and leaders in Northeast Ohio.

- I would like to visit and attend The Hive in Cincinnati for 3-4 days.
  - This is the organization that was co-created by a friend of mine years ago. It is not a community of a particular faith, but a community of people engaged in sacred practices and shared service. I think that there is something to learn from here that may serve our Hiram community well.
- I would like to visit and attend worship at Temples, Mosques, and Churches in Northeast Ohio.
  - This would serve my soul while also provide exposure to learn how other clergy lead worship, engage the congregation, and serve their communities.
  - I would plan to spend approximately six weekends attending services.

## **Church in the World:**

The Church in the World team is looking for those who wish to engage in local projects as well as wider-reaching projects. I have other ideas and would like to brainstorm with you, as well. I'm reserving a table at the next potluck on February 5th, if you would care to join me.

#### Food collection returns on the first Sunday of each month:

Beginning February 5th, the children will collect items from the congregation, and volunteers will deliver the items to the 4C's and NGCC food pantries. Food cupboards accept most any non-perishable food items, no expired use by dates. They also take basic hygiene items, toothpaste, single roll toilet paper and such. Cash donations on these Sundays is also appreciated.

#### **Growing Hope Globally: Maple Tapping**

It may be snowy midwinter, but nature pushes on to spring, and it is time to start preparing for our sap collection for our maple syrup season. Collecting bags and jugs have been ordered. Last year, despite our setbacks with defective collecting bags,



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we still produced and sold enough syrup to send \$1,430 to Growing Hope Globally to support the Guatemala Nebaj Quetzaltenango program.

Families in the western highlands of Guatemala have been victims of climate change and the dangers of political corruption, drug cartels and assassinations. Families have chosen to migrate north in search of safety, food and employment. Several from this region were among the dead migrants found in a tractor- trailer outside of San Antonio, TX.

We can help during this crisis by providing seeds and training for families to grow their own food, yielding enough for family sustenance and even surplus to sell at market. This means they can stay in their home communities with their families.

- 1. Preparing the bags
- 2. Tapping and collecting sap
- 3. Bottling the syrup
- 4. Tagging bottles for sale
- 5. Purchasing syrup to gift to friends or enjoy at your table.

We look forward to collaborating again this year with Nathan Goodell, and with the Hiram College Field Station students and staff on this exciting project.
