## Losing and Finding:

"God is not found in the soul by adding anything but by a process of subtraction." ~ Meister Eckhart (14th Century German Mystic)

There is such a blessed simplicity within this faithful perspective. That which we long for is not removed from us, beyond our innate reach only available to us through the adherence to doctrinal prescription or even orthopraxy, but woven into our most fundamental being. It is within our essence. And what Christ taught and guided the disciples into then - and what Christ teaches and guides us into now - is that this divine presence and this divine reign are never far from us, but often lay hidden beneath the additions we have accumulated along the way.

Within our scripture last Sunday (Luke 9), we heard as the disciples came to share news of a tragedy with Jesus. Some Galileans had been killed by soldiers during worship, and the disciples were wondering just how much the deceased Galileans had sinned to merit such a fate. Instead of allowing the horror to be heard; instead of grieving the deaths of their siblings; instead of caring for the survivors; instead of experiencing a righteous indignation at this gross injustice, the disciples held a belief that suffering is divine response... This theological construct was something that the disciples had picked up along the way, and it has led the disciples away from their siblings, away from their natural response, and, we may add, away from the heart of God. And so the word from Jesus was to "repent." Repent of the theologies and ideologies that offer sanctification to the protected and condemnation to the suffering; repent of the theologies and ideologies that turn the eye away from the systemic to narrow the scope and concentrate judgment upon the individual.

It is yet another reminder that we can accumulate ideas, philosophies, and yes even theologies that instead of illuminating the radical simplicity of God, community, and the soul, bestow a murkiness to our vision and distance between ourselves and our neighbors, our God, and our souls. There is no addition to such a mess that can redeem it. It simply must be released and lost beyond our desire to reclaim it, to then find something greater. Christ comes with the holy gift of radical communion - a simplicity of the soul and harmony with God, neighbor, the earth, and the life we live. It's not far from any one of us at any time (and fortunately this can never be lost!). If ever we struggle to find it, before we try to add something else, let us consider what might best be lost.

Blessings in the losing; blessings in the finding.

## Prophetic Witness:

#### Syrup news:

It's maple syrup season! Working with the Goodell family, Richard Master's farm, Hiram College, and members of Hiram Christian Church, we have embarked on another season of harvesting maple syrup to support the work of Growing Hope Globally. Many hands come together to make this all possible. Ron Etling, and Jim Tolan (from the college field station) are managing the field operation. Richard Masters gifts us with his sugarbush stand of trees for tapping and for the use of his barn for storage and water for cleaning the tanks. Steve Pancost loans his tractor for gathering in the woods. Nathan Goodell provides both a truck with large tank for the sap and does the processing at the family sugar house. And volunteers – both student and faculty from the college as well as from our church do the legwork for tapping trees, collecting sap, and transporting each day's collection. What a wonderful community effort!

With the money we raise, (over \$15,000 so far) Growing Hope Globally works with rural families around the world who depend on agriculture for their livelihoods. Programs provide training and tools to enable small farmers to become self - sufficient and resilient in their farming practices to meet the challenges of weather changes and soil degradation. GHG provides long term, **lasting** solutions to hunger.

#### Stewards report from David Dade:

The installation of a power vent gas water heater occurred on February 17, 2021. Silver Creek Plumbing completed the removal of the old water heater and installation of the new gas water heater.

Ken Roby of The Village Blacksmith inspected the existing church ramp in order to quote a replacement railing.

#### From our treasurer:

Hiram Christian Church has received a loan of \$15,123.75 from the Small Business Association Payroll Protection Plan (PPP). This money will be used to pay the church's 5 employees and utilities for the next three months. If we meet the obligations of the loan agreement (which is to use the money for those specific purposes), it is highly likely that the loan will then be "forgiven"; it will become a grant that we do not have to pay back.

The Church qualified for the loan because our revenue was down in 2020. While annual revenue was down only 6%, in the third quarter, revenue was down over 25% compared to 2019, which was the threshold for qualifying.

The Church also received a loan in the first round of PPP in May of last year for \$31,700. That loan was shared with Little Village Early Learning Center, to support their employees after the daycare had to close because of the pandemic. The Church used our share to pay our employees for 2 months and also covered some of our utility bills. The application for forgiveness is not available yet, but we are confident that this loan will become a grant.


Since we are operating with a deficit budget in 2021--our expected expenditures exceed our expected income by \$16,595 --this loan will help. This is not to say that we do not need our members and friends to continue supporting the church with their Pledges and donations! The additional money along with the generous support of the community will keep the Church financially stable despite the uncertainties of this year, and also help to cover any unanticipated expenses that may pop up as we hope to reopen the doors later this year.

Greetings from Oaxaca, Mexico, a few short days before Thanksgiving. The mail systems seem to have slowed down drastically lately, so we're imagining you will get this sometime between Valentine's Day and May Day! [editor's note: Bev was correct - it was received March 1!]. We hope that you have weathered your winter well and the complexities and tragedies of 2020 in general.

As many of you know, we have had to change how we do ministry here. While many things have gone to an on-line platform here, it is still very difficult for many people here who have limited access to the internet and it can be costly for many.

We are making wonderful progress on the Alberque project to house people near local hospitals, and hope to start fundraising early January. We have been able to provide over 2000 food baskets to help out people here struggling during the pandemic. These baskets are distributed through local Christians who are the hands and feet of the church!
